Lori Teller, DVM, DAVBP-Canine/Feline – Texas A&M University College of Veterinary Medicine, Former Associate Professor of Telehealth; current TVMA Executive Director

• Telemedicine: How Can I Implement It in Practice?

Telehealth can be a tremendous tool in reducing barriers to veterinary care, especially for those with geographic, transportation, or mobility issues that make it harder to access care. There are some significant ways that telehealth can be used in practice, and also some areas where telehealth cannot replace in-person consultations.

• Webside Manner: The Art of Telemedicine

We all know that veterinary medicine is both an art and a science. Communication via electronic means brings its own challenges and requires some specific know-how to be most effective when providing veterinary care virtually.

• Ethical Issues with Veterinary Telehealth

Veterinary telehealth is a tool that can improve access-to-care and provide convenience to animal owners. It can also lead to fragmented care, delayed or missed diagnoses, and inappropriate prescribing. This session will review the ethical considerations around using veterinary telehealth.

• AI and Emerging Technologies in Veterinary Medicine

This session will review the current and future role of evolving technologies and artificial intelligence in veterinary medicine, and the role that these have in improving animal health and welfare, as well as the potential impacts on how we practice veterinary medicine.

Michael J. Huber, DVM, MS, DACVS—Professor, Large Animal Surgery— Oregon State University Carlson College of Veterinary Medicine

Dr. Huber is a graduate of the University of California-Davis College of Veterinary Medicine, and completed a surgical residency at Oregon State University Carlson College of Veterinary Medicine. He has been a diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Surgeons since 1994.



Currently a professor of large animal surgery at Oregon State, Dr. Huber's areas of focus include Equine and food animal orthopedic and urogenital surgery, arthroscopy, laparoscopy and general llama surgery.

Marcie Logsdon, DVM, CWR—Associate Professor, Exotics and Wildlife—Washington State University College of Veterinary Medicine



Dr. Logsdon is an Associate Professor at Washington State University College of Veterinary Medicine, where she has been a faculty member since 2014. She earned her Bachelor of Science in 2008 and her Doctor of Veterinary Medicine in 2012, both from WSU. In 2017, she began collaborating with the

University of Minnesota's Partners for Wildlife initiative, a program focused on enhancing animal welfare in wildlife rehabilitation. She serves as the intern supervisor for the WSU branch of this program.

In addition to her work at WSU, Dr. Logsdon has run a deer rehabilitation facility on her property since 2022, and she is currently the only licensed wildlife rehabilitator for deer in eastern Washington. She is member of the board for the Washington Wildlife Rehabilitators Association and she also serves on the Advisory Council of the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife.

Dr. Logsdon is dedicated to education and outreach, regularly presenting at both regional and national veterinary conferences. Her commitment to continuing education led to her being named the 2024 Continuing Educator of the Year by the Viticus Group at the Western Veterinary Conference.
